
### Raids

# Reelers Spotlight: VPs Tom and Arlene Simansky

A boy named Tom lived with his family in a coldwater flat in Brooklyn. When he was eight, they moved to a house in Queens with *heat*, *hot water*, and *lights* in the hallway! From such humble beginnings, Tom retired from a 40-year career on the floor of the New York Stock Exchange. What happened in between those years?



Well, the teenage Tom learned to play golf, and a golfing buddy set him up on a blind date with a friend of his wife's from Queens.

"Arlene was obviously blind," he quipped, "but beautiful! I asked her out for dinner and she chose lobster. After that lobster investment, I just had to marry her."

Tom and Arlene bought a house in Queens. He was the opening and closing bell ringer for the NYSE, along with other responsibilities and pleasures – such as meeting Yogi Berra, Joe Namath, Martha Stewart, and Arnold ("not so big") Schwarzenegger, among others.

Tom was drafted into the Army Medical Corps for two years during the Vietnam War, where he became trained as an operating room technician. Although medicine was interesting, he decided to return to Wall Street rather than become a doctor.

In 1987, the Simanskys moved to New Jersey to give their four children a better education. Arlene was a stay-at-home mom and also continued caring for her brother, who had Down syndrome. "I took my children to their basketball, soccer, baseball, and football games and

> swim meets," she said. For many years, she was president of their daughter's swim team.

Now Arlene takes classes at the Morris Center Y, belongs to a book club, and makes ceramics. The Simanskys spend their summers at Lake Wallenpaupack in Pennsylvania, where Arlene teaches a ceramics class and takes water aerobics.

Tom retired on April Fool's Day in

2003. He has played several sports, but tennis has been his favorite for 52 years. Both Simanskys enjoy traveling, particularly cruises. They also took ballroom dancing.

Of course, a special shared activity for the past 15 years has been square dancing. Their interest was first piqued during annual summer barn dances and demos at Lake Wallenpaupack. Then in 1994, Tom spotted a square dance flyer in the Parsippany library and thought it was something he and Arlene could do together. They took lessons with Pal Johnson at Lakeland Squares, which they joined upon graduation and served as officers. A couple of years later, their friends Eileen and Bill Ebell persuaded the Simanskys to take Plus lessons with Wilson Hoff at Reelers.

"We enjoyed Plus and the Reelers so much that we decided to join," said Tom. They have been treasurers, secretaries, and presidents of the Reelers, and currently serve as vice presidents.

The Simanskys have attended many National Conventions – a good excuse to travel throughout the country! But for Tom, the most memorable dancing experience was a "White and Blue Demo" with Lakeland. In the darkened hall, dancers wore clothing trimmed in white and gloves with special blue lights. "We enjoyed the demo as much as the audience appreciated it," he recalled.

For both Tom and Arlene, the best thing that ever happened to them was meeting each other and raising four children – Paul, Annie, Thomas, and Jonathan. On Feb. 4, 2009, their first grandchild, Lila Patricia, was born to Paul and his wife Kim. All of the Simansky children live nearby.

With their rich life experiences, what words of wisdom do the Simanskys have?

Arlene: "My mother taught me to live by the Golden Rule."

Tom: "Racecar spelled backwards is still racecar."

The best thing that ever happened to them was meeting each other and raising their four children.

Come on, Tom! Anything else? Tom: "Kayak and level spelled backwards are also the same. And I hope we can grow along with the Reelers and square dancing."

Arlene: "We've made a lot of wonderful friendships through our square dancing and really enjoy socializing with our square dance friends."
