Special Dance! - Ken Bower (CA) will call an *all-Plus* dance with Star Tips (Plus DBD or Advanced) on Saturday, May 15 in Caldwell. Mary Pickett will cue, including half an hour of early rounds.

The Gathering – Helen Jacobson is a member of the committee planning this aftenoon and evening event on Saturday, October 9 at Douglass College (Rutgers), New Brunswick. Themed "Evolve, Or Die," it will feature a keynote address by John Marshall and breakout sessions on topics relevant to club leadership, followed by an evening dance called by John Marshall and cued by Mary Pickett. Tickets (ribbons) for the entire event: \$15. Gourmet sandwich buffet (optional): \$10. Calendars - The NNJSDA calendar is planned three years in advance. Currently, dances are held on various fifth Fridays and Saturdays, resulting in unevenly spaced events ranging from three weeks to three months apart. Beginning in 2013, the NNISDA will switch to a regular schedule of the first Saturday of the month – except July (conflicts with National Convention and 4th of July holiday) and November (Mini-Fest is the second Sunday of that month). First Saturdays are not used by any member club, and the new schedule will ensure 11 evenly spaced dances annually.

Ruth and Frank Pagano

Two families lived on the same street in Haledon, NJ, and each had a two-year-old. The families did not know each other and soon both moved away. When the toddlers became teenagers, each of them enjoyed eastern square dancing. The boy also played football for Hawthorne High School and the girl was in the color guard for Passaic Valley High. The schools competed in football games, but young Frank and Ruth never met. Until ...

Ruth graduated from Sherwood Secretarial School and worked for Kearfott Company. Frank was going to New Jersey Institute for Technology in the evenings while working as a technical writer for Kearfott. He often needed information on various files from Ruth. "We started having lunch together in the park across the street from the company," she recalled.

After Frank graduated with a degree in chemical engineering, he entered an engineering training program with General Electric. The young couple married, honeymooned in the Poconos, and then continued on to Cincinnati with everything they owned in Frank's car. GE then transferred Frank to Syracuse, where they lived for five years and had two sons. The next move was to Schenectady, where their third son was born.

Frank's boss invited them to take square dance lessons at the club where he and his wife belonged. They knew about western square dancing from Ruth's brother and his wife, who were members of Cross Trail Squares, and thought it would be a good way to make friends.

The Paganos joined the Electric City Twirlers in 1961, and attended a joint dance with several clubs. "Dick Jones was the caller and we had a wonderful time," said Ruth. They also square danced on television a couple of times. "Everything went well until the people started clapping and we could not hear the caller – and our square disintegrated!" After five years, the activities of their three young sons took precedence over dancing.

Frank left GE to help start a company involved in space simulation. He also coauthored a book on vacuum technology, which was used as a textbook for graduate students until a few years ago. After the company was sold, he worked in the environmental sciences in Reston, Virginia.

The Paganos moved back to New Jersey when Frank took a position as division manager at Nuclear Research in Dover while obtaining his MBA at Rutgers.

When their oldest son went to college, Ruth started working full time as a transportation specialist for the school system. She also started college in the evenings at age 40. After 10 years, she earned a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration, majoring in accounting. During five of those years, she worked as a buyer for Fairleigh Dickinson University in Madison, which provided free tuition for both Ruth and their youngest son. After graduating, Ruth spent 15 years as a Weichert real estate agent.



Frank and Ruth also made time for refresher lessons with Wilson Hoff through the Reelers, and joined the club in 1983. They knew that, once again, square dancing would be a good way to make friends. They also jumped right in to club leadership.

First they were raid chairs, and Ruth bought the club's first raid outfits. They also served as secretaries, refreshment chairs, program chairs, and presidents, holding most of the positions more than once. The Paganos are currently the club's historians. "We have never been without a position since we first started," said Ruth. "I feel the more you put into the club, the more you get out of it."

The Paganos have many other interests as well. Ruth was a Sunday School teacher for 15 years and worked with Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts for many years. Frank volunteered his time doing taxes for AARP and is currently involved in remediation for the county court system. He also enjoys mind puzzles – and, of course, reliving his high school days by watching football.

Both of them like golfing, reading, and playing bridge; when they moved to

Hamburg, NJ, Ruth started a bridge group and a book club. Frank takes an annual fishing trip to Canada with their sons, and both Paganos have traveled extensively all over the world.

"One of our most exciting trips was to Russia in 1984, during the Cold War. We were able to get into the country with the American Wives Club of The Hague because our son and his wife were living in Holland at that time. When the plane took off to return home, everyone started clapping in relief. We could tell many stories about that trip!"

On 9/11, the Paganos' middle son was on the 83rd floor of the World Trade Center. He was able to exit and was only a block away when the building collapsed. Shortly thereafter, Frank and Ruth went to Egypt to meet their oldest son and his family, who were then living in Brussels. Tensions were high, and an armored guard accompanied their rental car. As they approached Alexandria, they were escorted by two trucks – one in front of the car and one behind with blue lights flashing – each with six soldiers holding rifles.

On another trip, they were challenged by the weather during a cruise around Cape Horn. "There were winds of 90 miles per hour and gigantic waves. The captain kept announcing that we were experiencing 'extreme conditions.' That was obvious when the spray from the waves washed into the balcony on the eighth floor!"

The Paganos' oldest son now lives in Virginia and works for Exxon Mobil; his daughters are studying medicine and engineering. Son #2 lives in London and is a partner with Deloitte Touche; his daughter is studying medicine and his son will enter the Air Force as an officer after graduating from college this year. Son #3 lives in New Jersey and works for Pathmark.

Ruth's favorite saying: "You are responsible for making yourself happy." Frank's: "If you're going to do it, just do it." (He said it before Nike, according to Ruth.) So what was the happiest thing they *just did*? "Marry Frank and have our three sons," said Ruth. "And Frank says the best thing he ever did was marry me. (He'd better!)"

But square dancing is also a high point of their lives together. "We still visit someone we took lessons with over 49 years ago. Square dancing has brought us many years of pleasure and exercise," reflected Ruth. "And food," added Frank.


Dallying in the Dominican Republic
