Jean and Inars Gruntals

Inars Gruntals was born in Latvia, moving with his family to Germany when he was seven years old. Five years later, they moved even farther, crossing the Atlantic to settle in Ohio. Inars quickly learned English. He graduated from Fenn College (now Cleveland State University) with a degree in engineering science and joined an aerospace company in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

Jean, who was born and grew up in Milwaukee, graduated from the University of Wisconsin and taught elementary school. She met Inars at a young adult church group they both attended. Inars subsequently moved to Boston on a work assignment. A few months later, he came back to visit and proposed to Jean one balmy evening in June. They planned a September wedding in Milwaukee.

During that summer, Jean and her friend Ann decided to take a driving trip up the East coast, stopping in Boston to visit Inars. The young women arrived to discover that Inars had arranged for blood tests, applied for a marriage license, and talked to a minister in the hope of persuading Jean to marry then. It worked. They wed on a Friday and had a short Honeymoon Part I at Tanglewood before Jean and Ann continued their trip on Monday.

“When I shared the story with some people at Niagara Falls, they thought it was the strangest honeymoon they’d ever heard of – a bride, her friend, and no groom,” recalled Jean. A couple of weeks later, Jean and Inars finally went to Cape Cod for Honeymoon Part II.

They lived in Massachusetts, where Jean taught in Wakefield and Inars continued with his work assignment. Both went to graduate school part time until Inars’ assignment ended, at which point they studied full time to finish their master’s degrees. Right at the end of course work, their first daughter was born. Inars then joined Bell Labs in New Jersey for what would become a 34-year career, and Jean was a full-time mother to a family that expanded to two daughters.

When the younger daughter entered kindergarten, Jean began teaching in Chatham, and especially enjoyed the third grade. When the same daughter was com-

pleting high school, the Gruntals began looking for a physical activity that also had a social component. They saw an ad in the Randolph adult school catalog for square dance lessons sponsored by the Reelers. As children, Jean had square danced in gym class whereas Inars had once seen a square dance with a fiddler and one square at a church event.

They signed up for the class and joined the club after completing Plus lessons in 1988. The Gruntals have held most positions in the Reelers, from presidents to refreshment coordinators. In the coming year, they will serve a second time as secretaries.

Inars and Jean combine their pleasure in both square dancing and camping as members of the Garden State Square Dance Campers. On an RV trip out west, they located a square dance in Montana with a caller who was stationed at a nearby air force base. “There was just one square, but we still had a great time,” they said. “Square dancing has enriched our lives in countless ways.”

Both Jean and Inars like to exercise – Jean at Jazzercise and Inars in his home gym. Jean also enjoys reading all kinds of fiction, while Inars does much of his reading on the Internet following news from around the world. In the spring and fall, they both attend classes at Leisure Learning in Bernards Township. In addition, they like round dancing, attending plays and concerts, traveling, and family time.

“Our daughter Amy, who is married and the mother of our beloved granddaughter Julie, fortunately lives only half an hour away. Wendy, our other daughter, is married with two stepsons and lives in Georgia – unfortunately, more than half an hour away,” they lamented.

When the Gruntals retired, their present to themselves was a five-week trip to Australia and New Zealand. “From the natural beauty of New Zealand to the opera house in Sydney to Uluru and Alice Springs in the Outback to the barrier reef off Cairns, it was truly a memorable trip,” they agreed.

They have taught illiterate women reading, writing, tailoring skills, and financial literacy. My specific role will be to introduce into the school system a women's health curriculum covering reproductive health issues and violence against women. I just hope that I do not see any snakes!"
